Dear Friends,


The Women's Center of San Joaquin County is pleased to present our 2009/2010 Annual Report: **Effecting Change, Ending Violence**. Since our beginnings in 1976 as a pioneer in the field of domestic violence and sexual assault, the Women's Center has experienced three and a half decades of extreme growth. This report highlights the successes we have had despite adversity, as well as the resilient spirit of people who have experienced abuse and sexual assault.

Listed below are examples of new collaborations and community investment in our critical work:

- The Women's Center received \$238,000 from Congressman Jerry McNerney through 2009 Federal Appropriation funds. These funds expanded our Child Sexual Assault Response Team.
- The Women's Center flourished growing our budget from \$1.8 to \$2.1 million.
- The Women's Center teamed up with My Sister's House in Sacramento to pilot a Fostering Cultural Competency project with the goal of creating safety for women of all cultures. This collaboration resulted in a \$25,000 grant from California Endowment to the Women's Center.
- The Stockton Police Department partnered with the Women's Center and Victim Witness to secure a grant through Cal EMA for a Sexual Assault Specialized Response Unit resulting in a contract in the amount of \$62,500. This 18-month grant created a full-time Advocate who is located at SPD.
- In response to an increased request for domestic violence crisis intervention, St. Joseph's Catholic Healthcare West granted the Women's Center \$25,000 to support domestic violence services.
- Ameriprise Financial supported the Women's Center's effort to provide financial literacy at our shelters with a grant of \$15,000.
- The Women's Center was proud to receive a substantial gift of \$29,000 From the Lennar Charitable Housing Foundation to support domestic violence services in Tracy.
- The Women's Center was selected as one of 12 nonprofits to participate in the Nonprofit Finance Fund's Non-profit Business Analysis. The comprehensive report reviewed 5 years of financials and concluded that the Women's Center has been able to sustain its direct services despite the economic downturn and the state budget crisis, due to strategic planning and fundraising efforts.
- The Women's Center was selected as one of 37 applicants to be awarded a 2-year \$100,000 Organizational Capacity grant through the Women's Foundation to conduct a Multi-Media Domestic Violence Awareness Campaign.
- The agency invested nearly \$60,000 to network agency wide and launched a new website.
- The Women's Center received national attention from the delivery of a 73-year-old letter.

Despite the profound shifts and cuts in government and private funding that most nonprofits experienced during the 09/10 fiscal year, the Women's Center was able to weather the storm and remain relevant and strong in serving survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault. We hope that you enjoy the report and encourage you to consider making an investment in our success.

Financial Performance 2009-2010

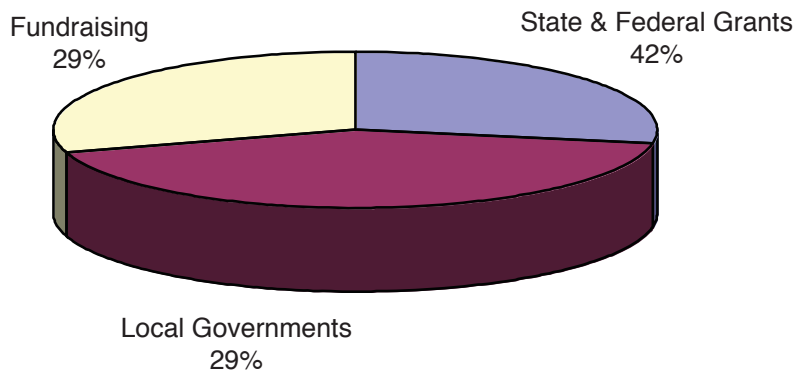
The Women's Center has come a long way from its initial budget of \$275 over thirty four years ago. The Women's Center began with eight savvy women who strategically planned a garage sale to raise funds to meet the needs of women and children in crisis in their community. The funds raised at that garage sale became the financial foundation of the Women's Center as we know it today.

This year the Women's Center raised a total of \$590,080 as a result of fundraising efforts from community donations, private grants and United Way. Despite the economic challenges our community has faced this year, the agency has continued to be the recipient of funding from individuals, businesses and community partners. The funds donated supported the more than 22,000 victims of domestic violence and sexual assault that received critical services from the Women's Center. These funds are crucial as they represent 29% of our agency income. The Women's Center is focused on continuing to diversify its funding sources in light of possible reductions to the state and local government funding levels.

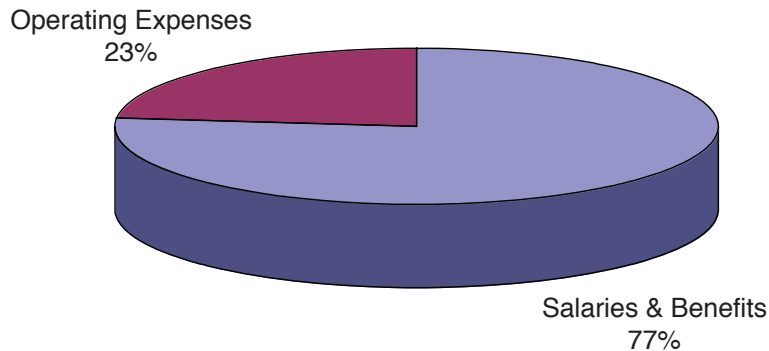
This year the agency effectively managed an operating budget of \$2 million, a 9% increase in comparison to the 2008/2009 fiscal year. In addition, the agency receives funding from federal, state, and local government sources which accounts for 71% of the agency's budget. The agency continues to operate in a cost-effective manner and reduced the administrative costs by 1% in comparison to the prior year. The agency's administrative cost for this fiscal year is 8% percent. The Women's Center strives to remain a credible and financially healthy organization with the assistance of the Board of Directors oversight. The board's prudence to ensure funds are managed effectively coincides with the agency's strategic plan to enhance long-term support for victims of domestic violence and sexual assault in our community.

Program income and expenses are allocated to the following programs: Sexual Assault, Domestic Violence, DAWN House, North and South County (Satellite Programs), Administration, and Fundraising. An independent audit is completed annually and 990 Financials are available upon request.

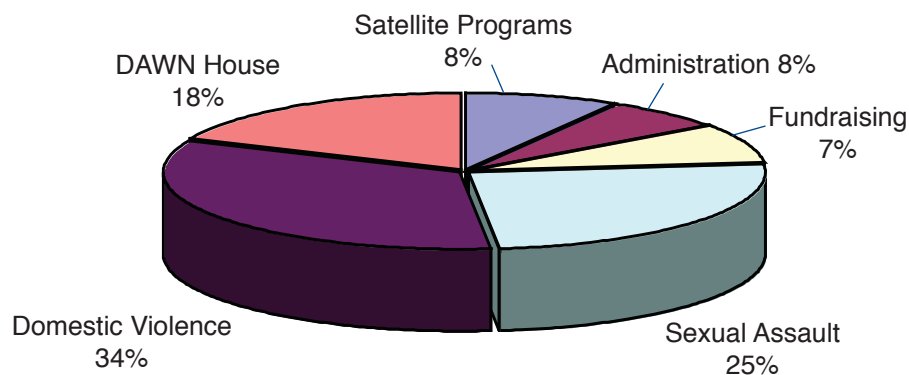
Agency Income 09/10



Agency Expenses 09/10



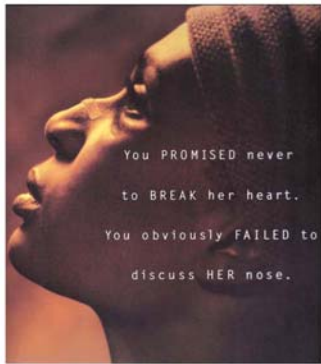
Agency Percentages by Program 09/10

EMERGENCY SHELTERS

Our shelters are a critical component in our crisis intervention services and continue to be the only undisclosed emergency shelters available to battered women and their children countywide. DAWN (Directions for Abused Women in Need) House, the agency’s largest shelter, was established in 1982 and TREE (Tracy Refuge for Education and Empowerment) House, located in Tracy, opened in the spring of 2003 with the support of Tracy Hospital Foundation.

The shelters provided the following services:

- Women and children who received emergency shelter at TREE House 74
- Shelter nights provided 19,710
- Child survivors who received one-on-one counseling through the “Just for Kids” Program & business office. 339
- Battered women and children who received emergency food and clothing through TREE House and DAWN House. 512
